Bedikat Hametz and Biur Hametz

The term חָּמֵץ hametz refers to leavened grain products. In addition to the general cleaning of the home before Passover, it is customary to complete a ritual search the night before called בְּדִיקֶת חָמֵץ bedikat hametz (the search for the hametz) and a formal destruction/removal ceremony called בְּעוֹר חָמֵץ biur hametz (the destruction of hametz). This process symbolizes the final removal of leaven from the home.

*If the first night of Passover occurs on Shabbat, perform this ritual on Thursday evening/Friday morning instead of the night before.

A Step-By-Step Guide

1 Place the Hametz

Before the search, it is customary to place small pieces of bread or other leavened items (ten pieces according to mystical tradition) in strategic places around the house so that the inspection is insured to yield results. Make sure to wrap them in paper so no crumbs get out and make a list!



2 Say the "Bedikat Hametz" blessing

Barukh atah ADONAI Eloheinu melekh ha-olam asher kidd'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivvanu al biur hametz.

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה ה׳ אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הְעוֹלָם אֲשֶׁר קִּדְשָׁנוּ בְּמִצְוֹתִיו וְצִנְּנוּ עַל בִּעוּר חָמֵץ:



Praised are You ADONAI, our God, Sovereign of the universe, who, sanctifying us with divine commandments, has commanded us to destroy all hametz.

3 Search for the Hametz

Traditionally, one would search by candlelight and use a feather to sweep any *hametz* onto a wooden spoon. You can use a flashlight and a broom. The hametz items are then placed into a bag which is burned or disposed of the next morning.



4 Say the following declaration

In whichever language you understand.

Kol hamira v'hamia d'ika virshuti, d'la hamiteih udla viarteih udla y'dana leih libateil v'lehevei hefkeir k'afra d'ara. פָּל חֲמִירָא וַחֲמִיעָא דְאִיכָּא בִּרְשׁוּתִי דְלָא חֲמִתֵּה וּדְלָא בִעַרְתֵּה וּדְלָא יְדַעְנָא לֵה לִבְּטֵל וְלֶהֲנִי הָפְּקֵר כְּעַפְרָא דְאַרְעָא:



All hametz in my possession which I have not seen or removed, or of which I am unaware, is hereby nullified and ownerless as the dust of the earth.

5 Finish the ritual

The next morning, after the last meal of hametz (check with your local rabbi for the exact time), any remaining crumbs (including the crumbs gathered the previous night) are burned or thrown out. We then make the following declaration in whichever language you understand.

Kol hamira v'hamia d'ika virshuti dahaziteih udla haziteih, dahamiteih udla hamiteih, d'viarteih udla viarteih libateil v'lehevei hefkeir k'afra d'ara. פָל חֲמִירָא וַחֲמִיעָא דְאִיפָּא בִּרְשׁוּתִי דַחֲזִתֵּה וּדְלָא חֲזִתֵּה דַחֲמִתֵּה וּדְלָא חֲמִתֵּה דְעַרְתֵּה וּדְלָא בִעְרְתֵּה לִבָּטֵל וַלָהֵוִי הַפְּקֵר כִּעְפְרֵא דָאַרְעָא:



All hametz in my possession, whether I have seen it or not, whether I have removed it or not, is hereby nullified and ownerless as the dust of the earth.
